We do this because it’s the right thing to do above all — but I also truly believe that, in the long term, it’s what wins consistently. I’ve now won three competitive primary elections — winning every precinct, and every method of voting, every single time.

This team believed: you can SAY you support expanding Medicaid, progressive tax relief, raising wages, and protecting immigrants all you want. But if you’re not ALSO engaging people on THEIR SPECIFIC imminent Medicaid redetermination; walking with someone through their first homestead exemption application; triaging and warmly referring people to local workforce and education programs (we go a step further: we’ve created some of those programs); or providing and explaining Know Your Rights information in-language, then it’s just talk — of which voters tire.

Also, even if you did have the power to legislate those issues, how can you truly do that well if you didn’t understand it through the lens of the person most impacted by it?

Taking Action


Redistricting/elections special session: The Governor has declared a special session for redistricting (for 2028 elections) and to address issues related to QR code mandate deadlines on ballots, beginning June 17. Keep in mind that the 2021 constitutionally-scheduled redistricting was struck down by a federal court as diluting Black/minority voting power, resulting in a redraw in 2023. Now this will be the third special session on redistricting in as many two-year sessions – and it's dire given the Supreme Court's recent decision in the *Callais* case, making it almost impossible to make the same kind of claims as was made in the 2021 litigation over Georgia maps.

I've already begun engaging, inc. at Common Cause's town hall in Gwinnett. **Go to <https://peoplemapga.com> to see your districts, read cases on how gerrymandering has harmed communities in Georgia, engage your elected officials (including those in leadership), and find other ways to get engaged.** Responsiveness of government is probably the most frequent complaint about government I see, and further gerrymandering will absolutely make it worse (even regardless of your personal partisan affiliations).

Together, we fight.


We brought community members together to break down what Georgia's redistricting moment means locally. The focus was on countering gerrymandering, representation, and the stakes of a fast-moving special session.

Yellow River Wildlife Sanctuary-adjacent rezoning: After working with residents regarding their concerns, we were able to get the developer of the lot adjacent to the Yellow River Sanctuary – another example of developers proposing high-density, but not-affordable housing at or adjacent to much-needed greenspace/conservation spaces – to withdraw the application and rework it. Conservation and housing don't need to be at cross-purposes, but that requires thoughtful planning and not just maximal rent-seeking and profit-making by developers.

Resurfacing

Street Resurfacing Information

The Gwinnett Department of Transportation resurfaces streets on an as-needed basis. This is funded by the Special Purpose Local Option Sales Tax, known as SPLOST, and state funds. The lists below include roads that will be resurfaced during the respective year:

Each year, Transportation staff rate the pavement conditions of roadways throughout the county. Streets that receive a rating of 55 or below on a scale of 100 are prioritized for resurfacing. Streets above that level are patched as needed and reexamined in the following years.

Asphalt is used in road construction. It is one of the most durable paving materials, but it is also flexible and can cause cracks in new pavement. The commonly used pavement maintenance techniques and typical steps in resurfacing our roadways are below.

Step 1: Crack seal
